

Scanning The Deep Sky


Recently, John Land was kind enough to part with his large collection of Astronomy and Sky & Telescope magazines, and (as I'm an unrepentant packrat) I was the recipient of John's largess. Among the magazines, was an unexpected treasure – a cache of old Deep Sky Quarterly magazines, issues #14 through #37 (which was the last published) that John had inherited from



Newell Pottorf. Now I don't know about the rest of you folk's but I always thought Deep Sky was an excellent resource and was disappointed to have learned that the magazine was no longer in publication when I finally "discovered" its existence back in the early 1990's. Well, our local library could request inter-library loans for perusal of a few back issues, but that's just not the same as being able to leaf through the magazine at one's leisure. Thanks' to John, I was like a cat in a creamery with over half of the published Deep Sky series at my fingertips.

I'm a big fan of "paperless" opportunities that the computer era was supposed to bring with it and have been largely disappointed that progress in that direction has been slow at best. I can't begin to count the amount of information

I've lost over the year because of mildew & mice consuming old magazine collections (...yeah, like I said above, I'm a packrat and I've got a bad case of it...). So I've decided to convert John's Deep Sky collection to paperless format, and make copies available to anyone in the Astronomy Club of Tulsa that would like an electronic copy. It is truly amazing how much "junk" you can store on a 250 GB hard drive without having to explain to your spouse why you need more bookshelves in the garage...




THE COMPLETE INDEX TO DEEP SKY MAGAZINE



I've scanned the complete set of volumes from issue #14 (Spring, 1986) completely through issue #37 (Winter 1991/1992) at 300 dpi and have saved individual pages in "PNG" (pronounced PING) format, since PNG's compression is fully lossless--and since it supports up to 48-bit truecolor or 16-bit grayscale--saving, restoring and re-saving an image will not degrade its quality, unlike standard JPEG (even at its highest quality settings). If desired, the individual pages can be printed as a complete magazine package to "PDF" (Adobe's "Portable Document Format") or just individual pages – including advertisements. If anyone wants to know what information is available, just email me at "djkarcher@cox.net" and I'll be glad to send you a copy of the complete Deep Sky Index in "pdf" format. And if anyone has copies of Deep Sky prior to issue #14 *PLEASE* share and let me borrow your

copies long enough to scan them. (Guaranteed to be non destructive to the magazine.) BTW – I'll bring the collection on memory stick to the next Club Meeting if anyone is interested – but be advised, the whole set is about 4GB in PNG format.
