Please join us at our next star party on Friday, July 21 at 8:00 PM at the RMCC Observatory. We will also be dedicating our new telescope for the observatory with a ceremony at 8:00 PM. Our new Meade 14" RCX400 telescope is being installed this month in the observatory dome. Come join us as we start a new era at the observatory with this new instrument.

July has arrived and summer is in full swing now. With our nation's birthday behind us, and some much needed rain here and there, we can look forward to some clear summer nights to enjoy the treasures along the summer Milky Way. We are working hard now to get the new telescope installed in the observatory for the dedication ceremony at the July star party. We have had a number of people that have lent a hand in getting the observatory ready for this new telescope. My thanks goes out to everyone who has helped with this project. This new telescope will bring a new dimension to our observatory. It will be a very impressive instrument to use with our group events that we hold at the observatory, and will be much safer for the small children to use, as they will not have to climb up a tall ladder to look in the eyepiece. It will also allow us to eventually set up an imaging system for use by club members. This will be something that will be added in

the future. This telescope will bring state of the art equipment and optics to our observatory and we are very excited to finally get a chance to use it.

Our June star party had to be postponed from Friday night to Saturday due to cloudy weather. Saturday started out a little cloudy as well, but cleared off very nicely by sunset. And what a night it turned out to be! With dry air moving in from the north and light winds, the sky was one of the darkest in recent memory with very little sky glow from Tulsa. Around 20 people showed up, and we had about a dozen scopes set up, with a handful of new members and visitors. Turned out to be a very good night, I only wish everyone in the club could come out on a night like that to enjoy one of those rare, nearly perfect, dark skies that we can occasionally get here.

The Tulsa Air and Space Museum's Planetarium has been open now for several months. If you have not been out to one of the shows, I would encourage you to do so. It offers a good way to get the general public a taste of astronomy in a unique way that can only complement what we do. So go out and help support this facility so that all in the area can benefit from it for a long time to come.

July's Astronomical highlights:

Jupiter continues to be the main attraction in the evening skies. It is the best planet to view at this time and offers plenty of interest in watching for the red spot and moon transits.

Mercury passes through inferior conjunction on the 18th and will not be visible until late in the month in the dawn sky.

Venus is still a bright morning planet in the southeast up before sunrise all month.

Mars is low in the west after sunset and is a tiny target now. It will be near the star Regulus on July 21/22.

Saturn sinks into the Sun's glare by month's end as it approaches conjunction in early August.

point from the sun in it's orbit
